WHAT CLASSES SHOULD I BE TAKING?

- The requirements to graduate from high school do NOT necessarily align with what 4 year colleges want to see
- Let's compare the requirements for a Standard Diploma vs. an Advanced Studies Diploma

Standard Diploma

- English: 4 credits
- Math: 3 credits
- Laboratory Science: 3 credits
- History & Social Sciences: 3 credits
- Health & Physical Education: 2 credits
- Foreign Language, Fine Arts or Career & Technical Education: 2 credits
- Economics and Personal Finance: 1 credit
- Electives: 4 credits
- Total: 22 credits

Advanced Studies Diploma

- English: 4 credits
- Math: 4 credits
- Laboratory Science: 4 credits
- History & Social Sciences: 4 credits
- Foreign Languages: 3 credits
- Health & Physical Education: 2 credits
- Fine Arts or Career & Technical Education: 1 credit
- Economics and Personal Finance: 1 credit
- Electives: 3 credits
- Total: 26 credits

WHAT DO 4-YEAR COLLEGES WANT TO SEE?

- Old Dominion University (ODU)
 - English: 4 units
 - Social Sciences: 3 units (World History, US History, and US government)
 - Math: 3 units (Algebra, Geometry, Algebra II)*
 - Sciences: 3 units of laboratory sciences
 - Foreign Language: 3 years of one foreign language or 2 years of two foreign languages
- *Students are encouraged to complete 4 units of math that include one unit of higher-level math courses (Trigonometry, Analysis, or Calculus)

WHAT DO 4-YEAR COLLEGES WANT TO SEE?

- James Madison University (JMU)
 - English: 4 years
 - Social Sciences: 4 years
 - Math: 4 years (one full year beyond Algebra II)
 - Courses recommended beyond Algebra II: Pre-Calculus, Probability/Statistics, Calculus
 - Sciences: 3 years of laboratory science
 - Preferably include Biology, Chemistry, and Physics or an AP/DE science; general science/earth science usually does not count
 - Foreign Language: 3 to 4 years of the same foreign language or 2 years of two different foreign languages
 - 4 or 5 years of one language or 2 years of two different languages would be viewed as stronger than just 3 years of one language

WHAT DO 4-YEAR COLLEGES WANT TO SEE?

- University of Richmond
 - English: 4 units
 - Social Sciences: At least 2 units
 - Math: 3 units in college preparatory mathematics (including Algebra I, Algebra II, and Geometry)

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
- Sciences: At least 2 laboratory sciences
- Foreign Language: At least 2 units of the same language
- Note: Competitive candidates for admission typically exceed the minimum requirements and have taken 4 units in all 5 core areas at the highest levels available in their school setting

SAMPLE 9TH GRADE SCHEDULE

- Honors English 9
- Algebra 1 (or higher)
- Honors World History & Geography: Part 1
- Foreign Language 1 (or higher)
- Honors Science (Biology, Chemistry, Physics, etc.)
- Honors Science OR Elective that you plan to stick with throughout high school (ex: Photography)
- Health/PE 9

CORE CLASSES

- What are core classes?
 - English, Math, Science, Foreign Language, Social Studies
- Core classes are VERY important
- Colleges look mostly at these courses when evaluating a candidate
- If you choose to take an elective each year, show a consistent interest



WHY SHOULD I BE THINKING ABOUT COLLEGE NOW?

- 1. It's never too early to start thinking about college!
- 2. You could be taking classes that appear on your high school transcript
 - Algebra 1, Geometry, and Foreign Languages classes all count!
- 3. If you know what colleges are expecting now, you can set yourself up to be a good college applicant from the start!



4 STEPS TO BECOMING A GOOD COLLEGE APPLICANT

1. Take Challenging Courses

- The #1 thing colleges want to see is that you are pushing yourself to take the most challenging courses available to you!
- Take as many Honors, Advanced Placement (AP), and Dual Enrollment (DE) classes as you can
- Did you know? Colleges would rather see a B in an AP/DE class, than an A in a standard class!



WHAT ARE AP/DE CLASSES?

- AP = Advanced Placement
- DE = Dual Enrollment
- Both are college-level courses
- Why are they important?
 - Taking college-level coursework will demonstrate that you are academically prepared for college
 - It shows that you have challenged yourself as a student

2. Get Good Grades

- The #2 thing colleges look at is the grades you receive in your courses
- 4 year colleges want to see all As and Bs on your transcript
- Colleges are looking for a strong effort and an upward trend
- •Good grades = money!

CALCULATING GRADE POINT AVERAGE (GPA)

- Your GPA starts in 9th grade and every course you take counts
- Each course gets a certain number of points—then the points you have in all your courses 9th-11th grade are averaged
- Colleges will see the letter grades you're receiving in your senior year courses, but the GPA they will judge you by will only include 9th, 10th, and 11th grade courses

3. SAT/ACT SCORES

- The #3 thing colleges look at is your SAT or ACT scores
- The SAT and ACT are both college-entrance exams
- Both tests require strong reading, writing, and math skills—be sure to practice!
- You can take either test, or both!
 - Most 4 year schools require an SAT or ACT score





4. GET INVOLVED!



- Colleges like to see well-rounded and involved students—join clubs, volunteer, play sports, work, etc.
- It is best to commit to **one or two** activities and stick with them all four years of high school if you can
 - That way, you can take a leadership position (like Vice President, Team Captain, etc.)
- Helping at home counts—watching younger siblings, working, and making money for the family

- The Scholarship Fund of Alexandria is a nonprofit organization housed in Room A-121 of T.C. Williams
 - Raises money and gives need-based scholarships just to T.C. graduates
 - Last year, the average award was \$2,700 renewable for all four years of college!
 - Gave over \$940,000 to T.C. graduates in 2015
